Greetings and prayers to you all! It's my joy to welcome you to this issue of *Bread Broken & Shared* and also introduce myself to many of you. Whether you are new to the Eymardian Family, Saint Ann Shrine, or the Blessed Sacrament Community's (SSS) regular newsletter, welcome or welcome back

to *Bread Broken & Shared*. The men of the Province of Saint Ann gathered in

Provincial Chapter (a meeting of all religious of the province) August 8–12 and with the Holy Spirit's guidance chose me to be the new provincial superior of the USA membership.

Longtime readers of this publication may have seen my columns on liturgy or vocation work or being the pastor of Saint Paschal Baylon, Highland Heights, Ohio. I continue doing all these ministries and have added a new one to my plate as the province leader. For those of you who have never known me, I grew up in the parish administered by the Congregation in suburban Cleveland, Ohio (Highland Heights).

My family has known the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament since before I was born, with my dad having an apartment on Euclid Avenue next to the old Saint Joseph's Seminary. We were blessed to grow up in an SSS parish. My parents are still leaders at Saint Paschal's and we pray for their continued good health in their 59th year of marriage! I'm blessed with a wonderful provincial and pastoral (parish) staff that make me look good and assist me in the valuable work with the Congregation and the parish.

For college, I attended the University of Akron to study music and education and obtain a teaching license. But, having known since I was six years old that God was calling me to be a religious priest, especially with my love for the Eucharist and liturgy, I joined the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament and professed vows in 1988. I studied at the seminary

at Catholic Theological Union, Chicago, our SSS seminary, since the 1970s. I was ordained in 1992 and later got an advance degree in liturgy from the University of Notre Dame in 1998. (Go Irish!)

I've been the vocation director but also served as the Diocesan Directory of Liturgy for Salt Lake City, pastor in Houston, Texas (Corpus Christi Church) and Albuquerque, New Mexico (Saint Charles Borromeo) and for the last 13 years at Saint Paschal Baylon Parish. During this time, I spent much more time with our men from vibrant, remarkable, and educational backgrounds, enriching my life with their faith and history.

What an honor it was to represent lay Associates at the Provincial Chapter this past week in Cleveland. I arrived in Cleveland at 10:30 AM Monday and was met at the airport by Gloria Jung (*Saint Vincent de Paul Parish, Holiday Florida*) and Tom Anderson, an Associate from Saint Pascal Baylon Parish (Cleveland).

The afternoon went fast while we assisted Susan Work (Executive Assistant to the Congregation) with assembling materials for the Chapter meetings and Mary Muehle, Associate Board leader at Saint Pascal Baylon Parish. The priests and brothers were finishing their afternoon sessions as we descended the stairs from our tasks in the upstairs office; Father JT Lane greeted us and invited us to join them in the Saint Ann Shrine Chapel for Evening Prayer. The sound of mostly men singing and chanting in this small chapel was a beautiful way to close the day that began at 4:30 Am. At the end of Evening Prayer, a remembrance ceremony for the six priests who have died since the last Chapter held in 2018 included lighting a candle for each and the opportunity to share a few words about that religious. Following Evening Prayer, many priests greeted and welcomed us before the three of us left for our planned dinner together—big hugs from Father Norman Pelletier and Father William Fickel.

Monday evening, Laura and Ray Worhacz (Saint Vincent de Paul, Holiday, Florida) and Greg Dufour (Associate Board Leader, Corpus Christi Parish, Houston, Texas) arrived at our hotel.

Tuesday was packed, and a beautiful day began for me with silent prayer in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament in the Saint Ann Shrine Chapel from 10-11:30 AM. All Associates who came in for the Tuesday meetings (approximately 30) joined the Congregation for lunch before our afternoon of meetings began. During the lunch hour, Father Lane asked me if I would be a Eucharistic Minister for the early evening Mass; Father Roger Bourgeois was going to be the celebrant (he turned 92 August 16th).

In preparation for the Chapter, all Associate board leaders were asked this past spring to submit an overview of how our Associates are carrying out the mission of the Congregation in our community. I offered that document as requested. Our afternoon of meetings was led by the provincial Father John Keenan; after each person introduced themselves and what parish



we represented, a rich discussion followed with all province priests and brothers in attendance.

During the afternoon, Father Keenan asked me to kick off the discussion by sharing with the group an overview of our Pathways to Care project; he introduced it as "a perfect example of living our mission as Associates" because it addresses the Rule of Life for *Associates* # 17 – *Service of Charity* and Social Commitment. I also shared our present book study with Father George Dunne SSS as part of our ongoing formation. Other Associate board leaders in attendance shared what their groups are doing locally; many are focusing on adoration, meals together (community building), and bringing in new Associates.

The afternoon also included discussion questions keeping in mind the modified Chapter Theme, "Our Aggregation, My Gift of Self":

- 1. How did I personally discover my vocation?
- 2. How do we help others find their vocation?
- 3. How do we see Associates going forward table discussion
- 4. What do I want to see in the future for the Associates of Saint Ann Province?

During the afternoon break, Father John Kamas (Saint Jean Baptiste Parish, Manhattan, NY) asked me to send him samples of the Associate materials we have created for some of our outreach events, Come and See, to help him with his Associates. The priests and brothers were extremely welcoming to all of us when we arrived and were genuinely engaged in our afternoon of conversation.

Following my morning adoration, four of us on the planning committee for a 2023 national gathering met. We are planning an All-Associate gathering in Cleveland for early August 2023, possibly a Friday evening through Sunday morning Mass. With a new provincial and leadership team, we will be meeting and seeking approvals. I returned to Florida late Wednesday evening, tired but filled with the Holy Spirit and truly happy that I attended this gathering. What a blessing! It was beautiful to spend time with longtime friends in the Eymardian family, reconnect with many, and meet new associates.

I'm sure we will all continue to pray for Father John Thomas Lane, the newly-elected provincial superior, our new leadership team, and vocations to the Blessed Sacrament Congregation. I look forward to having many more associates from Saint Stephen and other locales join me in August 2023 for this beautiful Eucharistic weekend in Cleveland as part of the Eymardian family.

Our board made the phone calls, and it was




Activity at Saint Ann Shrine


Eymard in his Own Words

Before his First Communion at the age of 12, Peter Julian composed a small book of Acts:

Act before Communion of Faith of Adoration

My dear Jesus, I firmly believe that your body, your blood, your soul, your divinity are truly and substantially present in the Blessed Host, which I am going to receive because you told me so. I adore you with all the respect of which I am capable. (Peter Julian Eymard – February 15, 1823)



2nd Act of Offering

My dear Jesus, I give myself to you as you have given yourself to me. On the following morning, Passion Sunday, March 16, 1823, I had the happiness of receiving Jesus into my heart – I immediately told him, "I shall be a priest – I promise you!"

Prayer in Honor of Saint Peter Julian Eymard

Gracious God of our ancestors, you led Peter Julian Eymard, like Jacob in times past, on a journey of faith. Under the guidance of your gentle Spirit, Peter Julian discovered the gift of love in the Eucharist which your son Jesus offered for the hungers of humanity. Grant that we may celebrate this mystery worthily, adore it profoundly, and proclaim it prophetically for your greater glory. Amen.

New Superior and Assistant in Cleveland

We hoped that the Provincial Chapter would bear fruit in the goal of internationality – so it happened! Morning came, evening followed, and our local Cleveland community met to discern a new local superior. The Cleveland community comprises three locations in the northeastern Ohio area—the provincialate in Highland Heights, our special ministries house in University Heights, and our assisted-living community

with religious in Richfield at Regina Health Center. All came together to continue the synodal process. Additionally, we affirmed the decision to be one community in three locations to show our ever-growing unity and love for one another.

Through the process, we first asked what the community needed at this time for local leadership. One desire was an international presence leading us, proudly sharing with the world that we wish the talents of all religious to be shared and support one another in the local community. The desire for more of our spirituality shared, studied, and lived also became a concern. So, for the first time, the local community chose a Filipino religious, Juancho (Choy) Ramos, as its local community superior. As assistant superior, Michael Angel

Perez was selected to work in spirituality and continuing formation.

For the first time in its history, the Highland Heights community, "the big house," has an international religious at the helm, with a religious of Puerto Rican descent as assistant. It should be noted that both Michael and Choy served as superiors at our House of Studies in the 1990s and 2000s, respectively, and Michael was superior in New York – Saint Andrew, but this is the first time we have had such a diverse, cultural base for our local leadership in our provincialate community.

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
